

BRIDE VALLEY CAR SERVICE



The BVCS is a volunteer scheme offering residents of the Bride Valley transport to and from medical appointments when they are unable to drive themselves or be driven by relatives or friends.

Clients are charged a mileage fee (currently 50p per mile) plus a standard charge (currently £1.00 per journey). Because the service depends on the availability of volunteer drivers, clients are asked to give as much notice as possible – we are unlikely to be able to respond to requests within 48 hours of an appointment.

BVCS simply provides door-to-door transport and cannot be responsible for assisting with clients' medical or mobility needs. Patients with complex transport needs for hospital appointments should contact the NHS Non-Emergency Patient Transport service.

FROM THE RECTORY

As part of our year focussing on prayer we have been doing The Prayer Course together, whether you've been a Christian for a long time or just starting out on a journey with God it's a really helpful way of discovering new ways to connect.

Actually, it's not too late to join us as the sessions are stand alone and we will be running all the way through Lent. Send me an email or give me a call if you'd be interested.

Pete Greig the author of the course starts by reminding us that it's all about relationship, if we don't speak regularly with our spouses, our friends, our parents, then what sort of relationship do we have. It's the same with God, we need to communicate, not only reaching out to him, but also listening to what he has to say to us. Often it is with a still, small voice of calm in the midst of what can feel like a storm in our life. That reassurance that 'all will be well' is absolutely precious.

Some people tell me they don't know how to pray, as if it's a skill that is beyond them. Let me tell you this, everyone can pray, in your own way! In fact, God longs to hear more from you.

I like the way Pete Greig puts it: Keep it simple, keep it real, keep it up.

The Bible tells us "God's Spirit is right alongside helping us along. If we don't know how to pray, it doesn't matter. He does our praying in and for us, making prayer out of our wordless sighs, our aching groans. He knows us far better than we know ourselves." Romans 8 v 27 (The Message)

I really like the way Thomas Merton, arguably one of the most influential theologians of the twentieth century, describes this in his prayer written in 1956:

Let us never forget that prayer doesn't need to be beautiful or right, simply honest.

My Lord God, I have no idea where I am going. I do not see the road ahead of me.

I cannot know for certain where it will end. nor do I really know myself,

and the fact that I think I am following your will does not mean that I am actually doing so.

But I believe that the desire to please you does in fact please you.

And I hope I have that desire in all that I am doing. I hope that I will never do anything apart from that desire.

And I know that if I do this you will lead me by the right road, though I may know nothing about it.

Therefore will I trust you always though I may seem to be lost and in the shadow of death. I will not fear, for you are ever with me, and you will never leave me to face my perils alone. Amen? Amen!

Remember this, day by day there are people throughout the Bride Valley praying for us all. If you ever have a specific prayer request please give me a call.

THE BRIDE VALLEY BOOK CLUB

Autumn by Ali Smith - February 2022.



This novel had a mostly positive response despite general acknowledgement that it was not an easy read. Ali Smith rarely tells a straightforward linear story and this novel was true to her usual form. We enjoyed the impressionistic approach and Ali Smith's clever word play. Autumn is the first of a seasonal quartet - this novel was published late in 2016 amidst the political heat of the Brexit referendum. Her focus was to draft, write, edit and get the book into bookshops in a very short timescale. Little did she know that in 2016 we would be entering an unprecedented period of political and social turmoil, initially because of the divisive Brexit campaign and referendum result and then - hot on its heels - a global pandemic. Each book in this quartet stands alone but all seek to reference contemporary cultural and social change - not all of it comfortable or commendable.

Here is Biddy's review:-

Autumn is about the friendship between a young girl and an older man, which begins when Elisabeth, aged 8, writes a pen portrait about her new neighbour for her school homework. The present scene is set years later when Elisabeth, now 32, visits Daniel Gluck in a care home where he lies mostly sleeping and drifting in and out of consciousness, remembering, dreaming, hallucinating.

But it is about so much more - art, politics, life and the work of Pauline Boty, the only female British pop artist with whom Daniel fell in love during the 1960s. Daniel shows Elisabeth how to look afresh as he paints a mind picture for her and when Elisabeth, now a student, discovers Pauline Boty's art - she decides to write her thesis on it. Centrally placed in Boty's collage named "Scandal 1963" is a photograph of Christine Keeler, the call girl at the heart of the Profumo scandal, seated straddling a chair, seemingly nude. Just as the photograph is the centrepiece of Boty's painting, the picture and its consequent story of falsehood and betrayal take a central position in the novel.

The complex structure of continual flashbacks, memories, images and poems is in itself like a collage in words with each scene adding to the whole picture. Daniel also enjoys playing with words and their meaning so "collage" becomes "college", Daniel is taking "leaf" of himself as he imagines himself turning into a tree, a surrealist image. There are also humorous scenes such as Elisabeth's visit to the Post Office to use their passport application service, with the clanking un-communal communal seat, the unpredictable customer number system and the assistant who tells Elisabeth that her face "is wrong", her eyes are not the right distance apart and that she should not have hair on her forehead.

The political commentary could have been made for today as Daniel says "we'll all be lessened by the lie" and "whoever makes up the story makes up the world", while some readers may find the constant changes of time confusing as the author paints the scene and builds up the story.

Superfast Broadband update

When approval of our application came through in Aug/Sept last year we only had a week to get people to sign up before the application was again frozen by "Procurement". Valley residents did very well with their voucher pledging and we got 75% of the properties we needed to make this application financially viable for Openreach to proceed.

Since then however we haven't had the opportunity to gather more names as the list has not been reopened. We've asked Openreach when our application can be reopened, and they have indicated that they are reassessing the situation.

On a practical note, there is an application in for Puncknowle and Burton Bradstock and just recently another in Shipton Gorge. This should link the Bride Valley through to Bridport and surely make it more attractive to Openreach to cover a larger block of linked villages, but one could be forgiven for wondering if practicality comes into Openreach planning.

So, in conclusion, there's nothing more to report other than Openreach will let us know if and when they decide to reopen our application, then there will be a flurry of activity trying to get the last 25% of people to sign up.

This will require help in finding out who and who hasn't signed up.

Our Night Sky in March 2022

Venus has now become a brilliant Morning "Star" rising in the east at about 0500, accompanied a little later by Mars which is much fainter. Although Saturn will be rising before dawn, it will be too faint to see in the lightening sky. Meanwhile, make the most of the winter constellations, especially Orion which will be sinking in the south west about midnight.

I wonder how many of you took time to ignore preparations of the Christmas lunch to watch the astounding launch of the James Webb Telescope (JWT) on Christmas day. Not only was the launch a flawless success, but the following unfolding of the telescope's sun shield and the mirror segments have also taken place without any problems. The telescope is now on its way to the No2 Lagrange point in space, where the gravity of Earth and the Sun cancel out, allowing any object placed there to stay in place without having to use fuel to manoeuvre. Approximately five months of further alignment and calibration lie ahead as the JWT completes a million-mile journey, before scientists will start getting the first images from the telescope. That work also includes settling into a stable operating temperature and calibrating on board science instruments.

The mirror is 21 feet, 4 inches across and made of beryllium coated with reflective gold. It is the shape and size that scientists determined was needed to measure infrared light from the earliest galaxies. The NASA team will continue aligning the telescope's mirrors, making minor adjustments, as it journeys to its eventual orbit.

Webb's more sensitive instruments will penetrate the gas and dust of space objects that have limited the visibility of its predecessor, the Hubble Telescope. This will allow the telescope to peer back to the very earliest days of the Universe, when the first stars and galaxies emerged after the Big Bang. It will also allow study of exo-planets' atmospheres to discern whether elements exist which could indicate the existence of life.

We live in an extraordinary time of space discoveries, and I hope to relay some of them to you in the near future

This service is available free to anyone who qualifies, in the towns and outlying villages, and books and talking books are delivered every 3 weeks. Due to Covid 19 we offered a limited non-contact doorstep delivery, but our volunteers are now able to enter people's homes again if both parties are happy and comfortable doing so.

The Library is OPEN on Monday & Saturday afternoons 2.00pm to 4.00pm and on Wednesday mornings 10.30am to 12.30pm

Jobs to Do in March

Lift and divide overgrown clumps of perennials and herbs.

Prune bush and shrub roses, hardy fuchsias, buddleia and late-flowering clematis.

Take stem cuttings from new growth on pelargoniums, salvias and fuchsias. Plant gladiolus corms and start dormant canna rhizomes into growth.

Start off your sunflowers in plugs indoors and begonia tubers in pots or trays of compost.

Sow hardy annual seeds. In the vegetable garden sow short rows of beetroot, broad beans, carrots, lettuce, peas, spinach and radishes; plant onion sets, shallots and first early potatoes if the conditions are good enough.

Protect vulnerable young plants with fleece or cloches if cold weather is forecast.

Thorners CE VA School



Thorner's goes green!

As you may know we have been trying to see if we can get several arrays of solar panels and air source heat pumps installed for our school as part of Dorset Council's SALIX decarbonisation bid.

Unfortunately, the original larger scheme has not been approved (due predominantly to the power supply that comes into the village being insufficient to run such a large set of heat pumps) but the slightly smaller scheme has been approved and is now going ahead - in two weeks time!

The work should take 6 weeks and the good news for our listed buildings is that there is only a small amount of internal work - replacing the electricity board and running some wiring so both the work and the finished article won't detract from our beautiful setting or historic buildings. In fact, from School Lane you won't be able to tell at all what is lurking behind on the modern flat rooves of the more recently built south facing classrooms.

The finished solar panels (they are going on nearly all the flat rooves) will create over 35,000 KW hours of free power - we will use this to power the school and the rest of the power we don't use will go back into the national grid. Later this spring, we will also get all our lights upgraded to be more efficient as well.

So, although we will have some short-term disruption, this will be a really good step towards making us a lot greener and producing lots and lots of free renewable electricity for us and others!

Thanks as always to everyone who has been involved in the bid, from governors to the Parish Council and those in the village who have offered their support both to me and directly through their conversations with Dorset Council.

We are of course going to do some project work on all of this with the children to give them the chance to explore what is going on above their heads every time the sun is out!

Extracted from Village Group FB Page and placed by farmer Richard Cuzens: "Today - more fresh dog poo in my field where my barn is - this time next to the footpath exit gate onto School Lane - the time, about 3pm. Neospora bacteria from dog poo trodden across grazing fields will kill unborn lambs & calves. Please ensure your dog has a poo in your own back garden before a long walk or keep it on a lead so you know where it's poo-ing. And pick it up. Thank you"

<u>Avian flu</u> is still prevalent in the area. All domestic fowl and captive birds must be kept in an enclosed area, preventing access by wild birds. Failure to do so may result in a visit from Defra and the birds culled.

To finish off the day, the 'Come Along Inn' will be open from 5.30pm with a simple BBQ and live music.


