BRIDE VALLEY CAR SERVICE



The BVCS is a volunteer scheme offering residents of the Bride Valley transport to and from medical appointments when they are unable to drive themselves or be driven by relatives or friends.

Clients are charged a mileage fee (currently 50p per mile) plus a standard charge (currently £1.00 per journey). Because the service depends on the availability of volunteer drivers, clients are asked to give as much notice as possible – we are unlikely to be able to respond to requests within 48 hours of an appointment.

BVCS simply provides door-to-door transport and cannot be responsible for assisting with clients' medical or mobility needs. Patients with complex transport needs for hospital appointments should contact the NHS Non-Emergency Patient Transport service.

FROM THE RECTORY

We are fast approaching Easter which falls in the middle of April this year. Easter is a season all about hope and I really wanted to find some hopeful words to share with you this month. The trouble is that I am writing this in the middle of March, just over two weeks since the invasion



of Ukraine by Russian forces, and I am not feeling very hopeful.

We have watched with disbelief and horror as the Russian invasion of Ukraine has unfolded. We have seen through the extensive news coverage the brutal destruction of Ukraine's homes, hospitals, schools and towns and the human suffering wrought on innocent civilians, many of them women and children. We see bewilderment and fear on the faces of the displaced and our hearts are broken for what is lost and threatened.

We are uncertain how best we can help as refugees in their millions pour out of Ukraine into neighbouring countries and thousands of others prepare to flee taking only what they can carry to safety. Others remain trapped praying that invading Russian forces will open humanitarian corridors to provide a safe way out.

The plight of the Ukrainian people is part of the ongoing story of humanity's inhumanity as people of power and tyranny battle to keep the upper hand. Every time this situation happens in our world we cry out with horror and vow that it must never happen again and yet, even with the refugee crises in Syria and Afghanistan still fresh in our minds we find another humanitarian disaster unfolding.

How can we respond to what is happening?

We can, of course give generously of our money and practical help to send supplies of humanitarian aid to Ukraine and countries receiving refugees. We may soon be in the situation of being able to open our homes to displaced individuals and families but sometimes all we can do is pray. But prayer can be hard. Sometimes it is hard to see where a loving God is in all of this.

But I believe God hears our prayers and weeps with the people of Ukraine because God has seen humanity inflict suffering so many times before. The Bible is full of stories of people fleeing into exile in foreign lands. Even Jesus' parents knew the fear of being a refugee as they fled with their special baby to Egypt from the dictator king Herod. And Jesus knew what it was like to be tortured and killed by those who thought he was a threat. Perhaps Jesus is closer than we think. The Easter story is one of suffering and death for Jesus, a man of peace and love and because Jesus trod that road to the cross he understands the human suffering of each Ukrainian soul and walks beside them today.

Each Easter we remember that Jesus, despite his suffering and death rose from the dead to new life. Ultimately the Easter story ends with triumph that love and hope prevails, that good conquers evil.

The Easter story tells us that hope is stronger than despair, that love is stronger than hate, that peace is stronger than war and that life is stronger than death.

This Easter I pray that this will be true for the people of Ukraine and for a world that longs for hope, love, peace and life.

Please continue to pray for the people of Ukraine and Russia and for peace throughout.

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Our Night Sky in April 2022

All the planets we have been enjoying in the evening sky have now slipped behind the Sun and emerged in the morning sky, with early risers seeing Saturn and Mars first, followed by a brilliant Venus, before the dawn sky brightens too much to see them. Make the most of Orion, who descends in the west about 2300, but see if you can identify Leo in the southern sky, whose paw, Regulus, is the brightest part of that constellation, and whose head looks like a reverse question mark?.

The James Webb Telescope continues on its path to becoming a focused observatory. The team has successfully worked through the second and third out of seven total phases of <u>mirror alignment</u>. With the completion of these phases, called Segment Alignment and Image Stacking, the team will now begin making smaller adjustments to the positions of Webb's mirrors.

After moving what were 18 scattered dots of starlight into Webb's signature <u>hexagonal formation</u>, the team refined each mirror segment's image by making minor adjustments, while also changing the alignment of Webb's secondary mirror. The completion of this process, known as Segment Alignment, was a key step prior to overlapping the light from all the mirrors so that they can work in unison.

Once Segment Alignment was achieved, the focused dots reflected by each mirror were then stacked on top of each other, delivering photons of light from each segment to the same location on NIRCam's sensor. During this process, called Image Stacking, the team activated sets of six mirrors at a time and commanded them to re-point their light to overlap, until all dots of starlight overlapped with each other.

Although Image Stacking put all the light from a star in one place on NIRCam's detector, the mirror segments are still acting as 18 small telescopes rather than one big one. The segments now need to be lined up to each other with an accuracy smaller than the wavelength of the light.

All this is taking place 1 million miles from Earth, with the telescope's team in constant communication with it. Their dedication deserves our admiration, and our hopes that the final images will be truly astonishing!

March Review



Anne Tyler : 'Digging to America'

Two families – one American, one Iranian – meet one another in an airport arrival lounge as two Korean babies are delivered for adoption. The narrative evolves as we witness the two families approach the challenge of adoption in their different ways. They decide to meet annually to mark the anniversary of the 'Arrival Day' and each year the celebrations become more complicated and revealing of the families' lives. During this process we meet the extended family and discover the characters involved, their developing inter-relationships and their histories. In particular we follow Maryam, who emigrated from Iran for an arranged marriage as a young woman and is reflecting on her position and assimilation, years on, seemingly as an American. We are encouraged to identify with the everyday hopes and fears of the parents and children – in fact the extended families - as they negotiate the challenges of adoption.

The author uses the microcosm of family life and the event of adoption as a means to explore the intricacies and fluidity of relationships, and in particular the themes of belonging, of alienation, cultural independence and identity - and of what it means to be 'American'.

Anne Tyler sets the story in Baltimore, where she lives, and writes about family and relationships which she handles with touching sensitivity and humour. Having married an Iranian, she uses her understanding of customs, foods and history in the detailed descriptions of the Iranian household.

There is no significant plot to this novel, which some readers found limiting, but all found the book to be beautifully written and appreciated the in-depth development of the characters. Anne Tyler has a light and subtle descriptive style, combined with a sense of humour which ranges from amusing to hilarious, which shows such understanding of human nature and makes for a deceptively easy, yet thought-provoking and memorable read.

Jobs to do in April

Late-flowering plants and grasses which have become weak in the centre would benefit from being divided this month.

Tie in the vigorous new shoots of climbers. Set up supports for taller plants ready to train in early growth.

Keep container displays watered.

Keep sowing hardy annuals for colourful summer displays.

If you are buying plug plants, once you have potted them on, protect them until all risk of frost has gone.

Cut back over-wintered pelargoniums and use the material for cuttings to make new plants.

Plant out Mediterranean herbs e.g. rosemary and oregano in free-draining soil; sow annual herbs indoors. Remember when potting on tomato seedlings, plant them deeper than they were to encourage new roots from the stems.

If the soil is warm, sow beetroot, cabbages, carrots, chard, leeks, peas, radishes, spinach and lettuces outdoors; sow celery, melons, sweetcorn, runner and French beans under cover.

As a Rights Respecting School, we have been working hard to support the children in realising their rights. Our value this half term is 'Love' and we have been discussing how the different rights respecting articles link to it. Article 6 – 'Every child has the right to be alive and develop in the best possible way' and Article 24 – 'Children have the right to the best health care possible, clean water, healthy food and a clean and safe environment to live in' are just two of the articles that link closely to this value.

Thinking about these articles, the children are rightly concerned about what is happening in Ukraine and are eager to show their support as they try to understand this situation. Our school council discussed how we can support those affected by raising money, but they also wanted to help on a practical level. They researched the items that aid organisations were asking for and, with the support of our school receptionist, wrote a letter to the school community outlining their plans. This spread into the local community, and we became a hub for humanitarian aid donations for the wider Bridport relief effort.

This week, children have chosen to support both Red Nose Day and the Red Cross DEC Ukraine appeal by wearing a yellow or blue item of clothing to school for a non-uniform day and also selling colouring sheets that they designed. We are also hoping to run a cake sale before the end of term, with proceeds going towards the relief effort.

World Book Day took place on the 3rd March. The children enjoyed attending school dressed as their favourite book character, discussing the books that they enjoy reading and taking part in other book related activities! As part of our celebrations, we had some visitors from The Bookshop in Bridport who came in to talk about their favourite books and they also brought the World Book Day books in for the children to exchange their vouchers for.

You may well have seen our Year 6 children out and about on their bikes recently. They have been taking part in 'Bikeability' and earning their cycling proficiency badges. They have thoroughly enjoyed their sessions and are looking forward to the freedom that the open road offers!

Discovery Centre - Buried in Time

Boosted by its success in the three categories of this year's Dorset Tourism Awards the West Bay Discovery Centre is now open six days a week for the summer season.

The Centre will be revealing its new pop-up exhibition "Buried in Time." Buried in Time features the coastal geology of the West Bay area and celebrates the 20th anniversary of the World Heritage Coast designation. It includes superb fossil specimens of creatures from the Jurassic age, some 170 million years ago.

The exhibition reveals that buried beneath our feet and in the towering cliffs is a history, not just of West Bay, but of the development of the earth through hundreds of millions of years. It makes the link between fossils and the real life creatures that lived in Jurassic seas. Buried in Time also tells the story of three individual fossil collectors, including how a boy's first chance fossil find near West Bay led to a lifetime of interest that in turn helped shaped scientific understanding of the development of the earth.

The exhibition includes hands-on activities for children and will be supported by talks and guided walks. The exhibition offers an entry point to understanding the World Heritage Coast, its geological processes and fossils, hopefully sparking an interest to find out more.

The exhibition runs until the end of October. The Centre, which operates on a charitable basis, is open 11am-4pm Tuesday to Sunday from 22nd March. It does not charge admission but welcomes donations from visitors to help meet its running costs. Find out more at the Discovery Centre's website www.westbaydiscoverycentre.org.uk.

St Michael and All Angels

These notes are being written a week to the day after Russia's invasion of Ukraine. What the situation there will be when this is read, nobody can foresee, but the village rallied round when

Mandy Wilkinson told us of the need for relief supplies, and several households have contributed food, clothing and bedding for the relief of the growing number of refugees in eastern Europe – thank you to all of them, and indeed to all others who have since responded to further appeals.

Littlebredy has its own connection with Ukraine. Until 2007, Robin and Lyubov Cuff lived at 2, Punchbowl Cottages, before moving to Bridport. Lyubov is Ukrainian by birth, and her father and siblings still live there (in a town called Sumy in the north-east of the country, only a few miles from the border with Russia – indeed it was attacked on the very first day of the invasion). The family is especially in our thoughts and prayers as the dire situation unfolds.

Turning to the future, last month's edition mentioned pre-planning for the Queen's Platinum Jubilee, to be celebrated over a long weekend at the beginning of June. Research has indicated her hopes for a national "street party" of community lunches on Sunday 5th June, and weather permitting we shall plan and arrange a lakeside bring and share lunch for everyone on that day. Please "save the date". Other ideas will be sought nearer the time.

With the covid restrictions easing, it looks as if Easter can be celebrated this year much as before, and it is hoped to resurrect the tradition of spelling out the Easter message in bunches of primroses on the Church window sills. Assuming enough primroses are in flower, this will need about 400 bunches of about 20 heads each, to be collected and brought to Church on Good Friday. Contributions from as many families as possible will be very welcome.

We hope to have the customary short and simple Litany Service at 10.00 a.m. on Good Friday (April 15), with a Holy Communion Service at 11.00 a.m. on Easter Day itself. These times will be marked by the Church clock striking on time again, which it has been doing since the end of February. The gremlin which was over-riding the satellite control and causing it to strike a few minutes early has been found and fixed.



'Holy Trinity Church Swyre'



Her commitment and integrity will be sadly missed'.







A very local **English Oak Tree** was recently planted at the end of Bonscome Lane by Joe Wood and Zac Rainbow to replace the ash tree that was suffering with ash die back. The oak was grown by Barbara West from an acorn taken many years ago from a tree in Bonscombe Lane near The Croft - you can't get more local than that!

The tree is well protected with a deer and rabbit proof guard and should grow into a lovely specimen that future generations can enjoy. The wood from the ash tree has been logged and donated to the New Inn by the Parish Council.

Thanks to Barbara for donating the tree and Bob Ayers for dealing with collecting and splitting the logs. Good job everyone!!

Talking of trees - Shipton Gorge residents are doing us proud! We originally aimed to plant 70 trees as part of the **Queens Green Canopy** to celebrate the jubilee. We are already way beyond that number, and still rising, with many residents planting one or more trees in their gardens and more trees being planted in nature reserves and woodlands within the parish. A list is being compiled of all the trees planted and where they are and this will form a record of our outstanding achievement for posterity.

Telephone landline changes.

The Council has learned that some residents will be switched to a "digital phone service" in the near future. This is part of a national programme that will eventually affect all households with a telephone landline. However the service will not work during a power cut, leaving homes without mobile coverage with no means of reaching the emergency services. 

On Friday, 18th February, Paul Atterbury gave a talk entitled "Golden Age of Travel", in which he told us about, and showed pictures of, the liners that crossed the Atlantic and their opulence. The major companies of the time, Cunard, P&O etc, competed both on the speed and luxury of their crossing. With the advent of cheaper air travel a number of these luxury liners became cruise ships. He also explained how many of these ships were accessed by equally luxurious trains, and how you could travel by train from Cardiff to Cairo!

Our next talk is on Friday, 22nd April, entitled "NCI Lyme Bay", *The speakers will be Judy Clarke, Station Manager of NCI Lyme Bay and her watchkeeping colleague, Karen Herbert.* You will hear about the origins of the national charity and how the 57 stations and more than 2500 volunteer watchkeepers provide eyes and ears along the coast, monitoring radio channels and providing a listening watch in poor visibility.
