The BVCS is a volunteer scheme offering residents of the Bride Valley transport to and from medical appointments when they are unable to drive themselves or be driven by relatives or friends.

Clients are charged a mileage fee (currently 50p per mile) plus a standard charge (currently £2.00 per journey). Because the service depends on the availability of volunteer drivers, clients are asked to give as much notice as possible – we are unlikely to be able to respond to requests within 48 hours of an appointment.

BVCS simply provides door-to-door transport and cannot be responsible for assisting with clients' medical or mobility needs. Patients with complex transport needs for hospital appointments should contact the NHS Non-Emergency Patient Transport service.

Calls cannot be taken at weekends.





FROM THE RECTORY

Putting "Christ" back into "Christmas"

This phrase was so overused in my youth that I think we all lost touch with any sense of what it means – lately it seems to have been reduced to making sure your chocolate advent calendar has a picture of the nativity on it.

Should we bring back this catchy phrase, perhaps reinvented a little? "Putting Christ back into Christmas" surely means connecting how we celebrate with why we celebrate. This of course means finding ways to tell the Christmas story afresh for this time and for new generations, but to me it means much more than that as well. It means celebrating in a way that is in keeping with our vocation as Christians to care for the world we live in and all the people in it, and our calling to live simply and with self-control.

Even those of us who are usually striving to live lives that are environmentally friendly, generous and ethical can find ourselves tempted to abandon these principles in the festive season, as we seek to make things special for ourselves and our loved ones with lots of presents, excessive food and drink, and glitzy decorations. But, does that really do justice to what we're celebrating? A saviour born to a poor family who would become refugees ... a God who loved the world so much that he was born here to save it ...?

Perhaps a more Christ shaped Christmas means finding a way to celebrate it that isn't at the expense of other people, or the earth. With that in mind here's a few suggestions:

Reuse your Christmas decorations rather than buying new ones – especially plastic ones – plastic will be here for life not just for Christmas!

Buy organic and local if you can – to reduce the impact your food has on the environment and the species that live in it. Cook a little less meat, and a few more local vegetables.

Try to resist the urge to buy new clothes, especially if you'll only wear them once or twice. The fashion industry is one of the biggest contributors to climate change and modern slavery!

THE BRIDE VALLEY BOOK CLUB



November Review

"The Haunting of Alma Fielding" by Kate Summerscale

Some of us were familiar with this author having read her previous best seller - "The Suspicions of Mr Whicher". We had very mixed feelings about the story of Alma, a housewife from the fringes of suburban south London, the paranormal events in her home and the subsequent investigation by Hungarian exile Nandor Fodor.

This true story lay beneath a rich archive unearthed by Summerscale in Cambridge University Library. In the febrile years leading up to WW2 - Alma became a cause celebre with the red top tabloids of the day when poltergeist type phenomena were reported at Alma's home. We needed to remind ourselves that mediums, seances and investigation of the paranormal were all guite popular in the period between the two world wars. We discussed various reasons as to why this might be - beyond it being a time when people were more gullible and impressionable. Fodor was already working for one of two rival "scientific" organisations in London both dedicated to researching and publishing the paranormal. He secured funding to investigate Alma and her home in order to try and understand - and provide evidence for - what was going on. Fodor began his mission believing Alma to be genuine but as his exhaustive investigation progressed he had to conclude that she was a fraud. Fodor had unmasked other fake mediums in the past so he was no stranger to the kind of ruses and trickery which could be used to dupe the general public. His methods were carefully documented with photographs, note taking, meticulous observations, intrusive body searches and even x-rays.

Summerscale relates the chronology of Fodor's investigation in painstaking detail and several of us found this became tedious in its repetition. It was at this point that some of us gave up and went on to read other more appealing books! However those who persevered found the latter half of the book more interesting. Fodor was well aware of the work of Sigmund Freud and knew of his flight from Vienna to London where he continued to practise despite being terminally ill. Fodor contacted Freud and shared his theory that Alma had a deeply suppressed trauma in her past which was driving her behaviour and self projection as the conduit of communication with the spirit

world. To Fodor's surprise Freud studied the research documents and broadly agreed with Fodor's conclusions.

We felt this account was an odd mix of historical enquiry, an exploration of cultural and sociological factors from the pre WW2 era alongside genuine strands of psychological theory. Summerscale's epilogue follows up on what happened to the protagonists in the years which follow. Fodor travelled to New York where he trained as psychotherapist/analyst. Alma and her husband moved to Branscombe in East Devon where they lived in a self build prefab bungalow on the cliffs. She was known to have conducted seances in the local village hall! This book is typical of Summerscale's fascination with the "dark side" of human existence. Some of us felt that Alma was the victim of trauma. It became apparent during the investigation that two of her children had died. The book posed several unanswered questions. Was Alma exploiting a clever fiction of her own making? Did Fodor initially really believe her to be genuine and were his investigative methods ethical? How complicit were the other occupants of Alma's house? How do we explain the fascination with this case in the public imagination?

Jobs to do during December and January

Now's the time to ensure everything is prepared for next spring; prevent pests and diseases accumulating by removing any remains of overwintering weeds, diseased material and old crops; continue winter digging, adding homemade compost or well-rotted manure; clean pots, trays and plant supports with mild disinfectant; clean, oil and sharpen tools. Clear leaves from the crowns of herbaceous perennials and alpines as they are vulnerable to rot in prolonged damp conditions. Regularly check stored fruit and vegetables for signs of decay.

In January sow chillies in a heated propagator. Sow early carrot varieties, leeks, onions and summer cauliflowers under cover. Sow some of the slowest growing annuals (e.g. petunias, impatiens, begonias and salvias) in modules and place them somewhere warm to germinate. Continue to winter prune apples and pears. At the end of the month begin chitting potatoes (encouraging them to sprout) by standing them upright in an egg box in a cool, light place. They will be ready to plant out in about six weeks. Use cloches to warm the soil for early seed sowing. Continue to ensure that birds have food and water, especially in frozen conditions.

Our Night Sky in December 2022

Venus and Mercury will be setting very soon after the Sun, but Saturn will linger until 9 pm while Jupiter will not set until 1 am . Meanwhile, Mars will be rising in the East soon after Sunset, followed by Orion, both of which will dominate the night sky after Jupiter has set.

The NASA DART mission aimed at altering the orbit time of Dimorphos round its parent asteroid Didymous has proved a tremendous success. Analysis of data obtained over the past two weeks by NASA's Double Asteroid Redirection Test (DART) investigation team shows the spacecraft's kinetic impact with its target asteroid, Dimorphos, successfully altered the asteroid's orbit by a greater time than had been expected. This marks humanity's first time attempt at purposely changing the motion of a celestial object, and the first full-scale demonstration of asteroid deflection technology. Images from a number of telescopes helped scientists calculate the orbit change resulting from DART's impact. The images sent back of the collision just before impact, showed a rubble littered surface suggesting that Dimorphos probably consisted of a loose collection of rocks rather than a solid object like Didymous. For those of you who have not seen the astonishing videos of the approach and collision, do visit the NASA web site.

Next month, I hope to tell you about how "Dark Energy" might be making the Universe expand at a much faster rate than had been previously measured.

Meanwhile, I wish all my readers and fellow sky watchers a very Happy Christmas and 2023.

News from Portesham Surgery

Merger:

Our two merger information evenings at Portesham and the Prince of Wales Surgery went well, with a good turnout of patients interested in learning how the changes might affect us all. We hope we reassured everyone that we do not expect you to notice many changes, and that you can continue to ring us and book your appointments here as before. Most of the benefits of the merger should happen in "back-office" savings and our ability to join forces with a larger clinical team which will help us to provide the same appointments even when we have GPs on leave.

Appointments:

We hope you are starting to see the benefit of the new appointments system introduced in September with much less reliance on e-consults and more face to face appointments available to book. The new system offers GP appointments for two weeks ahead so if you need a follow-up appointment further ahead you will need to ring us nearer the time. Nurse appointments can still be booked further in advance. We are now in the busiest time of the year so we do have to prioritise the most urgent patients – please bear with us.

Dispensary Opening Times:

From 1st December we will trial new collection times, between 8.30 and 12 noon (instead of 1pm as it is now) but from 4 to 6pm (an extra hour in the afternoon). We hope this will reduce the need to queue in the evening while still giving the dispensary a breather in the afternoon when they can focus on dispensing rather than dealing with patient queries at the hatch. Patients needing acute medication (urgent meds issued by the GP on the day) can still come at any time but we do ask those collecting non-urgent monthly medication to respect the opening hours as this allows the team to be more efficient and keep up with the workload. Thank you.

To women of a certain age, a date for your diary: 30th November 6.30 to 7.30

Our new GP Dr Charlotte Hill writes: "After years of silence the menopause has finally gone mainstream. This is a cause for celebration. I hope to be able to raise awareness and continue the conversation with patients and colleagues alike. Most women will experience symptoms of menopause. Some of these can be severe, including poor sleep, anxiety, memory problems, hot flushes, itchy skin, tinnitus, and palpitations.

Lack of menopause awareness and support is costing the UK close to £10 billion, according to analysis by Balance Menopause. Raising awareness, supporting women to seek menopause care, and encouraging open conversation benefits everyone. Please join us at the Surgery and for an educational evening on all things Menopause."

FULL FIBRE BROADBAND

As you may have heard, our application to Openreach to use the government's voucher scheme to bring full fibre broadband to Shipton Gorge was unsuccessful. However we have been talking recently to **Jurassic Fibre**, another major installer of ultrafast broadband, whose network has recently gone "live" in Bridport and Weymouth and who are interested in extending this in our direction.

We have therefore invited Penny Jones from Jurassic to give a short presentation in the village hall starting **6.30 pm on Wednesday 11th January** to explain who it is, what it can offer to communities like Shipton, and to answer your questions. The session will probably run for 45 minutes. If you were interested in our original application, or if you have recently moved to the village and would like to learn about future-proofing your broadband, please come along.

Remember, getting full fibre broadband installed under the voucher scheme is a community-driven activity, and the greater the level of interest we show the more likely we are to succeed.

Helping the Planet in the Bride Valley

Over 50 years ago, the writer John Fowles at Lyme Regis concluded "What we don't, or won't know [about the environment] is that the getting-right cannot be left to government, to the people who are paid to care...... Conservation can never be someone else caring. It is you caring. Now.".

It is no surprise that many people in the world feel helpless in the current, rapidly deteriorating situation. The militancy of organisations such as Extinction Rebellion and Just Stop Oil is, sadly, perceived by some (including many politicians) as a form of political anarchy and can therefore sometimes be counter-productive.

The Help Our Planet (HOP) project has been set up to address these issues and encourage people to do what they can to help individually or in groups. Talks by experts on the environment and combatting the effects of climate change are being held at Sladers Yard, West Bay, on a monthly basis and will continue throughout 2023.

There are many issues of concern in the Burton Bradstock Parish that need to be addressed. The local countryside; including the precious Jurassic coast, is paying the price for the expansion of caravan sites, and other tourist facilities.

The ecological balance is being disrupted more and more by felling of mature trees, bonfires, removal of hedgerows and clearance of river banks. Equally disturbing is the pollution of the inshore waters by discharge of sewage, rendering the water off Chesil beach down to West Bay and beyond hazardous to swimmers, as numerous notices in the media have testified.

Hive beach, of course, so popular with holiday-makers, families and children, is the responsibility of Wessex Water but ultimately is it up to the Parish to exert pressure on those responsible. Pressure groups include Surfers against Sewage.

The 'Butterflies and Amazonia' programme is part of the HOP project, raising funds for the work of the WWF, Survival International, the church and others working in the Amazon.

The next event: 'Saving the Amazon and its Peoples', with the first Anglican Bishop of the Amazon, Saulo de Barros, biologists Professor Philip Howse, Sir Ghillean Prance, and soprano Katherine Fuge is on Monday December 12th, 2.p.m. at St Mary's Church, Bridport.

Donkeys will be among the congregation, and it is understood that each youngster who is there will be given a memento of the occasion. Again, all are welcome to travel down the valley to share in the service.

Therefore this is also the opportunity to wish everybody in Littlebredy or connected with the village in any way a very happy and fulfilling Christmas season, and a successful and fruitful 2023.
