FROM THE RECTORY

Your kingdom come, here and now!

When Jesus taught his disciples how to pray, the words he used in each account of what we now call The Lord's prayer included: 'Your kingdom come'. Last year our new Bishop encouraged us to pray afresh 'Your kingdom come, here and now. But, what does that mean for us, as individuals and as a community within the Bride Valley.

The disciples recognised that Jesus' day-to-day actions flowed from his intimate prayer life with God and they wanted their lives to reflect the same. One factor in Jesus' teaching on prayer involves us understanding that God's kingdom has not yet been completely fulfilled on this earth. 'Your kingdom come' is not just a yearning for the coming of Christ in the future, it is a longing to see God's kingdom become increasingly established throughout the world, here and now.

Your kingdom come, your will be done on earth as it is in heaven. (Matthew 6 verse 10)

Your kingdom come means asking our heavenly Father to help us be authentic and effective as Christians. That way we spread God's kingdom not only with words but also through our actions and the qualities of our character.

Praying, "Your kingdom come," is the same as saying, "Dear Lord, please open the hearts of my loved ones, friends, co-workers and neighbours to receive Your gift of salvation in Jesus Christ."

Another way we seek the establishment of God's kingdom in the here and now is to pray for aspects of God's nature to be revealed and known in the world. So overwhelming was Isaiah's experience, that he saw the glory of God's holiness filling the whole earth:

"Holy, holy, holy is the LORD Almighty; the whole earth is full of his glory" (Isaiah 6 verse 3).

When we pray, "Your kingdom come," we ask God to shine His light into the world so that others may respond to Him with awe and reverence. Jesus is the light of the world who breaks through the darkness of sin by His work on the cross. As believer's we too can become lights to the world playing our small part in the coming of God's kingdom, here and now. With every blessing,

BRIDE VALLEY CAR SERVICE



The BVCS is a volunteer scheme offering residents of the Bride Valley transport to and from medical appointments when they are unable to drive themselves or be driven by relatives or friends.

Clients are charged a mileage fee (currently 50p per mile) plus a standard charge (currently £1.00 per journey). Because the service depends on the availability of volunteer drivers, clients are asked to give as much notice as possible – we are unlikely to be able to respond to requests within 48 hours of an appointment.

BVCS simply provides door-to-door transport and cannot be responsible for assisting with clients' medical or mobility needs. Patients with complex transport needs for hospital appointments should contact the NHS Non-Emergency Patient Transport service.

To book a journey please call our voluntary co-ordinator on 07393 607025 (note new number) between Monday and Friday.

Calls cannot be taken at weekends.

Our Night Sky in February 2023

Venus will be setting in the west at about 1915, followed by Jupiter at 2115. Mars meanwhile will continue to dominate the southern sky during the night, setting in the north west about 0300. It has been a brilliant object during the past months since it has been at its closest to Earth; its eclipse by the Moon in December was an amazing sight for those lucky enough to see it. It will begin to fade as it continues on its orbit round the Sun, which means that at its most distant, it will be about 130 million miles from Earth as opposed to the 40 million or so it has been recently.

The successful December mission of Artemis round the Moon with an accurate splashdown after re- entering the atmosphere at 25,000 mph, was an amazing effort, and it provided scientists with a wealth of data from the sensors on the dummies that were on board. Providing the dummies "survived" the adventure and an actual astronaut would not have succumbed to the multitude of forces experienced, the next Artemis mission should have live astronauts aboard, who will orbit the Moon before returning to Earth. If that is successful, Artemis 3 should have a crew that will land on the Moon and carry out preliminary investigations for setting up a permanent base. All this in preparation for a mission to Mars sometime in the distant future; however, it is not beyond the realms of possibility that a future Mars explorer has already been born. We live in exciting times, and I hope to be able to tell you about some of them in future articles.

Bride Valley Gardening Club

The Bride Valley Gardening Club starts its new season on the evening of Monday March 20th at 7.30pm with a talk from Joy Michaud on 'Choosing the Right Variety'. This meeting will take place at LATCH in Litton Cheney.

Jobs to do in February (weather permitting!): If we aren't under a layer of snow or a foot of water, now is the time to start pruning and tidying up plants before they burst into growth. These include ornamental grasses, mophead hydrangeas, clematis that flowers after June and over wintering

fuchsias. Cut back ivy, Virginia creeper and overgrown hedges before birds start nesting. Trim winter heathers and winter-flowering jasmine once they have finished flowering. Put a 5cm layer of mulch on pots and borders to suppress weed growth and conserve moisture. Continue planting new flowering shrubs and lilies in pots. Sow hardy annuals under cover to plant out in spring. Continue preparing seed beds for vegetables and warm the soil with cloches. Feed fruit bushes with a high-potassium plant food. Sow broad beans, Brussels sprouts and lettuces under cover. Sprout early potatoes in warmth and light to produce strong shoots. Continue to feed and provide fresh water for the birds; regularly clean feeders and bird tables/baths



Gigabit Broadband – internet connectivity for the future!

Gigabit Broadband – internet connectivity for the future!



We know our village suffers from slow broadband speeds and poor mobile signal strength. With BT's announcement of the 'Copper Switch Off ' in 2 years' time (yes, no more traditional copper phones lines by 2025!), Gigabit technology is the foundation for addressing these issues. Burton Bradstock has had an application for this faster broadband since June 2020 and although progress has been slow it is progressing. Previous details can be found on the village website under the News and Events heading – 'Our Gigabit Broadband Application'.

In February there will be a Question & Answer session on Gigabit broadband in the village including a visit from Jurassic Fibre, a local internet service provider. We invite all those interested to attend so that we can move to the next important stage. The more interest expressed the better the chances of getting vouchers and the quicker we can get this technology into our village.

Jurassic Fibre is looking to bring its full fibre network to Burton Bradstock. In the first instance, the team is seeking to engage with the local community to explore local connectivity issues and ascertain interest in its service.

The Jurassic Fibre build is dependent upon demand, so if you are interested in better broadband but unable to make it, please do register your interest online at https://jurassic-fibre.com (Enter your postcode under "Can I get Jurassic Fibre?" and follow instructions to register.)

Registering your interest does not commit you to signing up with Jurassic Fibre; rather it creates the case for them to come to us.

Residents of Burton Bradstock are encouraged to attend the session in February to find out more about Jurassic Fibre and meet the team. Please keep an eye on the local Facebook village, library and parish council sites as well as noticeboards around the village for the date, time and venue. We look forward to seeing as many of you as possible.
