

## From the rectory

As I write, during this last week we have seen and heard the most tragic news following a horrific earthquake that has affected North Turkey and areas of Syria including the region of Aleppo. The earthquake registered 7.8 on the Richter scale. Nearly a week after the tragic event the death toll has risen to 33,000 and is expected to double. That depth and magnitude of loss is almost impossible to imagine and overwhelming in reality to respond to. Many charities are appealing for donations, financial and otherwise.

As churches from across the Bride Valley this year we are looking at **"Your kingdom come, here and now"** from the Lord's Prayer. I cannot help but contemplate what that means for the people of Turkey and Syria right now. And yet, as we look at the news, there is the hope, of a 2-month-old baby, who had survived 128 hours under the rubble. Once again, we are urged to "look for the helpers" and there are many, leaving to go immediately the tragic incident happened, to do their bit.

Luke 11:1-4 frames the Lord's Prayer slightly differently in that it's the disciples that ask the question of Jesus. For Jesus it was in prayer that he brought his frustrations, his challenges, his burdens and the burdens he felt for others to his Heavenly Father. So often when Jesus acted, he responded from a place of compassion, being moved to respond and help those in need.

What comfort can be gleaned from Jesus' words when asked by his disciples to teach them to pray.

I believe they have watched Jesus closely, seen how he modelled a life which followed a different way of being. Retreating to a quiet place to reset and refocus himself. And I wonder if we need to follow that example. We live in an age when we can end up suffering with what is now termed 'Compassion fatigue'. What, I believe, we mustn't do is allow ourselves to be neutralised to inaction but activated, moved to react and act to support in any way we realistically can.

It may not feel like much at the time but if we all do our bit then we can make an enormous difference to those in need.

## BRIDE VALLEY CAR SERVICE

The BVCS is a volunteer scheme offering residents of the Bride Valley transport to and from medical appointments when they are unable to drive themselves or be driven by relatives or friends.

Clients are charged a mileage fee (currently 50p per mile) plus a standard charge (currently £2.00 per journey). Because the service depends on the availability of volunteer drivers, clients are asked to give as much notice as possible – we are unlikely to be able to respond to requests within 48 hours of an appointment.

BVCS simply provides door-to-door transport and cannot be responsible for assisting with clients' medical or mobility needs. Patients with complex transport needs for hospital appointments should contact the NHS Non- Emergency Patient Transport service.

To book a journey please call our voluntary co-ordinator on 07393 607025 (note new number) between Monday and Friday. Calls cannot be taken at weekends.

## Our Night Sky in March 2023

Jupiter will be setting in the south west at about 7pm, while Venus remains bright in the South western sky until she sets at about 9pm. Mars will be high in the sky above Orion, but becoming visibly fainter compared with its brilliance during the Autumn, as it moves further away from Earth. It will set in the North west about 2am. Saturn has now moved to the morning sky, but is still lost in the brightening dawn sky.

Meanwhile, NASA's Mars Perseverance rover recovered two new samples from the Martian surface on Dec. 2 and 6 last year. But unlike the 15 rock cores collected to date, these newest samples came from a pile of windblown sand and dust similar to but smaller than a dune's. Now contained in special metal collection tubes, one of these two samples will be considered for deposit on the Martian surface sometime this month as part of the Mars Sample Return campaign. Scientists want to study Martian samples with powerful lab equipment on Earth to search for signs of ancient microbial life and to better understand the processes that have shaped the surface of Mars. Most of the samples will be rock; however, researchers also want to examine regolith - broken rock and dust - not only because of what it can teach us about geological processes and the environment on Mars, but also to mitigate some of the challenges astronauts will face on the Red Planet. Regolith can affect everything from spacesuits to solar panels, so it's just as interesting to engineers as it is to astronauts.

#### Jobs to Do in March

Prune bush and shrub roses, hardy fuchsias, buddleia and late-flowering clematis. Take cuttings from new growth on pelargoniums, salvias and fuchsias. Plant gladiolus corms and start dormant cannas into growth. Sow sunflowers indoors and begonia tubers in pots or trays of compost. Sow hardy annual seeds. If conditions allow sow short rows of beetroot, broad beans, carrots, lettuce, peas, spinach and radishes; plant onion sets, shallots and first early potatoes. Protect vulnerable young plants with fleece or cloches if cold weather is forecast. *Cilla Jones (Secretary)* 898473

## Bride Valley Book Club – Book Review

#### The Beekeeper of Aleppo by Christi Lefteri

This book is the story of two refugees, a husband and wife from Aleppo in Syria. It tells the story of their flight, after the death of their young son. Nuri, the husband, is trying to manage the whole process and take difficult decisions to get them through borders and across countries, while conserving his wits and enough money to guide his wife, who is blind, to a better and safer life.

It is a harrowing and gruelling tale but told with sensitivity and intimacy. One feels that the writer knows this couple and, in a way, she does. Christi Lefteri is herself the daughter of refugees and she wrote this book after a period working as a volunteer at a UNICEF centre in Athens. It follows Nuri and Afra as they take their perilous journey from Syria, through Turkey, across the sea and to Athens, where their journey seems, by turns, hopeful and doomed until they are confronted with the system for applying for asylum. The ending is perfectly crafted. To anyone not familiar with refugees or their plight, it is a haunting story and one which we would all be the better for knowing – whatever our dispassionate view of the possibilities for solving the refugee crisis. *Reviewed by Mandi Sturrock.* 

#### The Nickel Boys by Colson Whitehead

This is an action packed book but it is difficult to read due to the harrowing circumstances described. It is a fictionalised story based on true events in 1960s Florida USA at a notorious Juvenile Reform School called The Doziers School for Boys. In this novel the corrupt and abusive school is known as The Nickel Academy. Elwood Curtis is a bookish black teenager who admires Dr Martin Luther King but finds himself sentenced to The Nickel Academy for innocently accepting a lift in a stolen car. Once at Nickel he makes friends with Turner, a more streetwise boy. Elwood is an idealist and the two boys are very different. Elwood suffers cruel beatings and solitary confinement until Turner overhears a plan to kill Elwood and bury his body 'out back' in a secret graveyard. They escape but Elwood is shot by Nickel staff when apprehended. Turner manages to get away and later assumes the identity of Elwood. Turner eventually starts a successful removals company in New York. Many years later Turner learns that forensic archaeologists have uncovered the secret graveyard at the now closed down Nickel Academy and he travels there to face his traumatic past. Our Bronze Ambassadors have been running lunchtime games and activities for other children. These have been a great success; it has been wonderful to see all the different activities happening.



## St. Michael and All Angels

Due to a technical error the February Little Bredy entry was omitted from the printed edition. It is now printed here, followed by the March entry.

**The February Little Bredy entry:** This was originally anticipated to be giving prior notice that we would be saying farewell – or at least au revoir – to the de la Mare family, whose time at Orchard Cottage would be coming to an end at the end of February. However, circumstances changed and in practice Tom and Rosy and the youngsters left the village for a new home not far away, in West Chelborough, shortly before Christmas. We wish them all happiness there, and suspect (and hope) that Littlebredy may not have seen the last of them entirely.

They did indeed make what was technically a return visit for the annual Boxing Day duck race from the waterfall to the Riverside bridge, which was the culmination of the village's Christmas celebrations. These had included an exceptionally well-attended Christmas Day communion service in Church, when there was hardly a seat to be had. Many thanks as ever to Rector Jane for leading the service and of course for the commitment she and her fellow clergy and lay ministers always have to put in on what are so-called "festivals" for the rest of us.

As for the duck race itself, it was the customary enjoyable success in both social and financial terms, raising £600 for the Weldmar Hospicecare Trust. It was a more interesting course than usual, because of the still-overflowing sheep dip, and the winning duck was owned and trained by Ben Pentreath, who presumably celebrated with some local Sauvignon Blanc, as he and Charlie were in New Zealand on the day of the race. Congratulations to all concerned, especially Edgar and Jacqui Moxom for all the organisation they had put in.

Possibly at this end of the valley it is mainly those who are concerned with the local production and distribution of the Bride Valley News who are aware of the sudden and unexpected death in early January of Anne Gillson, who has been the Editor for the past several years. Getting the magazine out each month is a major task, and her great contribution has been much appreciated. We use this column to send our condolences to all who are close to her and are grieving her loss.

**The March Littlebredy Entry:** The village has received publicity from two very different sources recently. During the January snows (remember those?) the front page of the Dorset Echo contained a big picture of John Barker's Exmoor ponies amidst a white landscape in the Valley of Stones (not identified as such in the paper, though).

Conversely, in a more summery context, the editor of the January edition of "Wisden Cricket Monthly" magazine chose as his "cricket book of the month" a small anthology of evocative poems and prose entitled "Into the Long Grass". This has recently been compiled in admiration of the cricket ground here by members of a touring team which used regularly to visit Bride Vale C.C. on the strength of their friendship with David Inshaw, creator of the famous "Cricket Game" picture, painted here in 1976, part of which adorns the front cover of the book and was illustrated in the magazine.

Those who have visited Bridehead recently for carol singing, Harvest Suppers, etc., may have noticed the second large version of the same painting hanging in the hallway, a tribute to Inshaw's love not only of cricket in general, but especially of the picturesque ground where the game has been played here since 1900.

Many will already know of the sudden tragic death of one of Tom Foot's farm employees, Phil Trent, who collapsed and died at Longlands Farm at the beginning of February. We send sympathy and condolences not only to his widow Elaine and their two daughters, but also to the shocked farm staff who tried without success to resuscitate him. The village defibrillator was brought into use, also sadly without success, and a refresher course to remind us how to deploy it is now being planned for an evening before too long. This will be advertised round the village when a date and venue are chosen.

#### **Priority Services Register**

The electricity and water companies covering our area are establishing a register of priority customers who might be especially vulnerable during a disruption to their power or water supply. People on the register will be contacted in advance of a planned outage but also when a supply emergency occur. They will provide information on how households can be more prepared in advance for these events but may also provide back-up equipment, such as generators or portable heaters if needed so that people are less affected when these things occur. People eligible to go onto the register include those with health conditions, families with small children and any household with people aged over 60. So it is wide ranging and should prove very useful. We are hoping to have leaflets on how to apply shortly and will also post notices on the village boards, circulate information via the email link and on the community Facebook page too so look out for this being circulated or if you prefer contact the parish clerk who can give you more information on this potentially very useful scheme for many households in the village.

The Council agreed at its January meeting to revert back to meeting on the first Wednesday of the month. Meetings follow a hybrid format and a zoom invite will be published on the website the week before if you would like to attend virtually. Apologies for having to cancel the Full Council meeting scheduled to take place on 15<sup>th</sup> February 2023. Unfortunately it was unavoidable due to matters beyond the Council's control.

#### **Parish Council Vacancies**

The Parish Council currently has Councillor vacancies and is looking for community minded people to join it. #### **Parish Precept**

At its meeting in January the Council agreed to request a precept of  $\pounds 26,586$  from Dorset Council for the 2023/24 financial year. This will mean the annual Band D charge will be  $\pounds 46.95$ , a  $\pounds 3.02$  annual increase from the previous year. The precept allows the Council to continue to provide a range of services to the local community. These include the allotments, the play area and playing field which is used by the school, Corncrake field which is currently a popular dog walking area, the library building, the Post Office held jointly with the Village Trust and the Reading Room which is available for hire (see below).

In addition, the Parish Council comments on local planning applications and supports a range of organisations through grant funding and other support.

#### **Reading Room for Hire**
