BRIDE VALLEY CAR SERVICE

The BVCS is a volunteer scheme offering residents of the Bride Valley transport to and from medical appointments when they are unable to drive themselves or be driven by relatives or friends. Clients are charged a mileage fee (currently 50p per mile) plus a standard charge (currently £2.00 per journey). Because the service depends on the availability of volunteer drivers, clients are asked to give as much notice as possible – we are unlikely to be able to respond to requests within 48 hours of an appointment.

FROM THE RECTORY

For God so loved the world that he gave his only begotten son, that whoever believes in him, will not perish but have eternal life. John 3.16

Sometimes it can seem a bit bizarre, all the trappings around Easter, the eggs, lambs, bunnies, crosses, flowers. Nowadays the shops that sell homeware and gifts have been trying for ages to tempt us to put up pink and yellow bunting and hang up Easter decorations that were definitely not a part of the Easters of long ago – you might have painted a hard-boiled egg or made a miniature Easter Garden, but that was all. There were chocolate eggs available for a few weeks before, and hot cross buns were only sold around Easter, not all year round like now.

And yet, despite the awfulness of the manner of Jesus' death – one of the worst and most deliberately shameful methods human power has come up with – we are celebrating and commemorating something awe-some in the true sense of the word. We are remembering the ongoing work of redemption of the whole of creation by our God who loves us so much that he sent his only son, to be human like us, to live among us, to experience our human life in all its joys and sorrows, its loving relationships and betrayals and its pain and death. We are celebrating that there is ultimate hope in this bruised, battered and broken world – that there is redemption for the worst of our human traits – that we are each of us loved beyond all human imagining.

As you eat your eggs and see the new life of spring around us, be reminded that although the stories of Holy Week involve betrayal and torture and pain and death – the worst we humans can afflict on each other – the story of Easter Sunday, of Jesus being alive once more, is that love triumphs over all of that and even over death itself. It is a great and wonderful mystery. We would love for you to come and share with us in any of our services as we once more explore those stories together.

Jobs to do in April

Divide hostas to reinvigorate them. Cut back over-wintered pelargoniums and use the material for cuttings to make new plants. Keep container displays watered, the leaves can prevent the rain reaching the roots. Keep sowing hardy annuals for colourful summer displays. If you are buying plug plants, once you have potted them on, protect them until all risk of frost has gone. Plant summer-flowering bulbs. Plant out Mediterranean herbs e.g. rosemary and oregano in free-draining soil; sow annual herbs indoors. When potting on tomato seedlings plant them deeper than they were to encourage new roots from the stems. Sow beetroot, cabbages, carrots, chard, leeks, peas, radishes, spinach and lettuces outdoors; sow celery, melons, sweetcorn, runner and French beans under cover.

Our Night Sky in April 2023

Jupiter will now be finally lost in the setting Sun's glare, but Venus more than makes up for his disappearance and setting about 11 pm. Meanwhile, Mars will be visible for most of the night, but will be more difficult to see as he has faded from his brilliance last year as he retreats from us. He is still pink, and distinguishable from stars as planets do not twinkle. Meanwhile, Saturn will be rising with the early dawn sky about 5am, but will be difficult to see.

I wonder how many of you saw the delightful conjunction over a number of days, during early March, of Jupiter and Saturn, culminating in a very close encounter on the 3rd. We were lucky to see it as the clouds parted.

We tend to think of the thousands of millions of galaxies that inhabit our Universe as being lonely travellers in space. But, by their very nature, they all have a common ingredient – Gravity. This almost infinitesimal part of any body – just as we as human bodies exert a tiny gravitational attraction towards any other body, so galaxies are attracted towards each other, firstly forming groups, then merging into one another to form even bigger galaxies.

When we consider how tiny our planet is among the thousands of billions of stars in thousands of billions of galaxies, it is hard to imagine that we might be the only inhabited planet in the Universe

Bride Valley Book Club - Book Review

Hamnet, reviewed by Maggie O'Farrell

This critically acclaimed novel tells the story of Anne Hathaway, wife of William Shakespeare. The focus is on the short life and death of their boy twin, Hamnet, but events from both earlier and later in Anne's life are also important. Several of us had read "Hamnet" when it was first published. Most - but not all of us - became emotionally engaged with the story of Agnes - married to the unnamed playwright from Stratford. It is interesting that O'Farrell chose to re-name Anne Hathaway and to deny a name to Shakespeare himself despite the novel being quite obviously an imagined narrative of their marriage, bereavement and separation. Of course we know little about Shakespeare's wife apart from what the parish registers tell us and the puzzling bequest of the "second best bed". Perhaps the author felt that the name shift/elision gave her a freer hand? Several of us commented on the very real sense of time and place in and around Stratford. We found the description of poor Hamnet being carried off by the plague (although we cannot be certain this is how he died) heartbreaking. In many ways the novel becomes a study in grief from this point on. O'Farrell chooses her language with scholarly care - with echoes of well-known phrases from Shakespeare's plays. Some of us felt the novel changed direction when Agnes leaves Stratford to seek out her absent husband in London. In some respects the ending up in the theatre and watching his play was a grand finale but in other ways it did not feel a seamless continuation of what had gone before. From down through the centuries - Anne/Agnes is brought to life.

News from Portesham Surgery

Partnership Changes

As from 1st March we have new partners at the surgery. Dr Charlotte Hill, who joined us as a salaried GP in September, has accepted the offer of partnership alongside Dr Stephen Scott and Dr John Robertson from the Prince of Wales Surgery. They, and the other GP partners from Prince of Wales, are now working here one or two days per week so you will get to know them all in time. We are aiming towards full merger of the two practices in the summer. The main difference you will notice over the next few weeks is that there are more GP appointments available than we have had for a while, and your registered GP will change.

Health Champions

Our patient volunteers have been meeting regularly and running two projects:

- a Portesham walking group called "Walk and Talk" which is proving popular and meets every Tuesday at 10.00am at Portesham Village Hall:
- A befriending scheme where patients experiencing short-term problems such isolation, bereavement, loneliness, mental or physical health issues, are given a buddy who is there to talk things through and support them.

The health champions are now ready to get their third scheme off the ground, which is to revamp our surgery garden. We are looking for volunteers for the first work party to be held on Saturday 1st April, 10.00am till 12 noon. We would particularly benefit from the loan of a rotavator to get us started!



Faster Broadband - update

Jurassic Fibre (JF) is exploring the possibility of providing a higher speed (150-950 Mbs) broadband service to villages in the Bride Valley. The service they would provide is currently broadband only with costs currently varying from £20-£45 (e.g. £22.50/150mbs/24 month contract). Installation is included in contract and also includes routers to any rooms that are not covered by main router. They currently don't provide TV packages. People can stay with their current provider until the end of their contract; JF cable is then for customers only, maybe opening this to other providers in the future.

It is likely to take up to winter this year to get a service to Burton; Puncknowle may take longer due to distance. They are using BT trunking (already authorised) but the wiring (fibre) is separate from BT and will be serviced by their own engineers.

Provision is dependent on levels of interest here and in Burton, so JF need to know whether there is interest from Puncknowle for this service and request that individuals register interest on the JF website – registering does not mean any obligation to go ahead at this stage.
