From 'Open the Book'

In the middle of February comes St Valentine's Day which, in times past, was a declaration of romantic love. In more recent times this has become a celebration of love and now cards may be sent to express love between family and friends. The Bible contains two commandments about love that are of paramount importance: to love God with all your heart, soul and mind and to love your neighbour as yourself. These are the



first two of the Ten Commandments in the Old Testament and are reinforced by Jesus, who was the exemplar of them, in the New Testament.

The logo above represents Open the Book (OtB), which is an organization that was started by a couple in Bedford who formed a team from local churches to dramatise Bible stories for primary school children in a simple and enjoyable way during a school assembly. Each story concludes with a quiet time of reflection for the children which is based on love; either by the knowledge that God loves and cares for them or by asking them to think about ways to help others thus showing love.

OtB spread to sixty plus schools in the area followed by others all over the country until it grew so large that it was taken over by the Bible Society in 2013 and is now used by many other countries around the world. The stories used are from the 'Lion Storyteller Bible' and later supplements by Robert Hartman. In the Bride Valley we have a team made of volunteers from local churches attached to each of our primary schools. All teams must be registered with OtB, agree to a strict code of practice, have a DBS check and fulfil safeguarding requirements. They must also agree to 'uphold the integrity of OtB by sticking to the text to ensure the material can be used in a Christian or multi-faith context' and thus not seek to proselytize. As leader of the Burton team, I can only speak for what happens here where the majority of parents of our primary school children will probably have heard their children talking about these Collective Worship sessions as they are very popular. Our team of adults dress in costume with accompanying props and use the older children for minor roles and extras. It is often great fun and provokes lots of laughter

as children and adults get together. OtB is welcomed by both schools and parents as it contributes to the children's religious, spiritual and moral education and their understanding of the nation's cultural heritage as well as helping schools meet the statutory requirements of OFSTED and SIAMS. I hope this provides a background for parents about the OtB Friday Collective Worship so that when they come home and tell you about the boy who stoned a giant, an Egyptian army drowned in the sea or a young chap thrown in a lion's den it may sound violent but the concluding reflection is always based on well ... Love, actually!

Clients are charged a mileage fee (currently 50p per mile) plus a standard charge (currently £2.00 per journey). Because the service depends on the availability of volunteer drivers, clients are asked to give as much notice as possible – we are unlikely to be able to respond to requests within 48 hours of an appointment.

The children have returned from the Christmas break ready for the challenges of the new term. We have welcomed some new pupils into our Preschool and also a new member of staff into our Year 5/6 classroom. Mrs



Holloway joins us with a lot of experience and has already settled in really well. All classes have started their new topics. Robin class enjoyed the start of their topic 'Magnificent Monarchs' by thinking about what they would do if they were King or Queen for the day!

During December and the beginning of January, we hosted the Scholastic Bookfair at school. Families were able to buy books with a percentage of all

money being spent going back to the school. As a result of this, we were able to buy £175 worth of books for our classrooms and school library and update some of our class reading books



which staff read daily with the pupils. We hope to hold another bookfair in the summer term.

This half term, our value is Friendship. As part of our planned Collective Worship, we will be looking at the way that Jesus showed friendship in the bible, looking at how this links to the UNCRC, especially Article 15: Every child has the right to meet with other children and to join groups and organisations, as long as this does not stop other people from enjoying their rights.

Although this is a short half term, we have lots of plans to get out and about. Kingfisher class are heading to the beach next week, Forest school is happening weekly, there are sports



events planned as well as a whole school visit to the Bridport Players Pantomime. I look forward to letting you know more next month.

Thorner's Primary School Report

Our teachers have been very busy this term working hard on different areas of the curriculum and engaging in some superb CPD with other small schools in the West Dorset Collaboration. We have all received an excellent training day on a variety of areas of SEND and we also have undertaken several smaller sessions - in which classroom teachers, TAs, SENDCOs, Mental Health Champions, Maths and English Co-ordinators as well as RE and PE leads in our respective schools have had the chance to share best practice with other teachers in small schools like ours. These sessions have been invaluable in creating working groups in which staff can bring concerns and suggestions about how best to cover all of the required areas in the curriculum in a manner which stimulates and excites the children.

Our approach at Thorner's has been to formulate a series of 60 Big Questions - the required knowledge to answer these questions is then built up over the 6 years the children study the National Curriculum with us and also lead into the subjects they will undertake in Yrs 7-9 at secondary school. The children have also recently applied to become Subject Ambassadors for their favourite subjects which has created a group of pupils keen to talk to teachers and governors about how best to move their subjects forward and what resources and trips we can plan for to make each Big Question more memorable and exciting.

Out of class, Mr White and our Eco-Committee have been adding their persuasive weight to an application the school has made for some solar panels on the south facing roof of LATCH. The children have written a letter to Low Carbon Dorset setting out all the reasons why solar panels would benefit us as a school in the space where we have our assemblies, lunches, PE lessons, after school clubs and performances. As an Eco-School we are always looking for ways to be greener and as a small school the possible associated savings on energy also help us direct more of our budget into things for the children such as trips and resources. The Eco-Committee have also set up a system in which not only is our paper/cardboard and food waste all recycled but now we have a process in which we recycle all the 'springback' plastic that the school produces too - these steps are really helping us become more

sustainable and giving the children fantastic insights in to what can be done through collective action. As one child put it so well in an assembly - "You can't really throw things away - as there isn't really a place called 'away' - it just becomes someone else's problem"

Our Night Sky in February 2024

Saturn will be setting shortly after the Sun, while Jupiter continues westward until it sets in the North-west about midnight, while Orion sets about 1.00 am. Venus and Mars rise in the Southeast shortly before the Sun, but will be lost in increasing daylight.



There were five total NASA-sponsored payloads on a spacecraft called the Peregrine Lunar Lander (named for the fastest flying bird on Earth) which was launched towards Moon on December 24th. It was due to touch down on a region of ancient lunar lava flows known as the Bay of Stickiness, or Sinus Viscositatis. However, Peregrine suffered a fuel leak and as with so many previous missions which have not succeeded, it illustrates how difficult this type of flight is, especially with a new and previously untested craft. However, if you don't try you learn nothing and history is full of initial failures.

The mission will have set back the manned missions to the Moon planned by NASA, and we will have to await further information when a full analysis has been undertaken.

Book Review: Bride Valley Book Group Book Review: The Confessions of Frannie Langton, by Sara Collins

We celebrated the new year with a lunch at The Three Horseshoes, Burton Bradstock. I regret to say that the majority verdict was a thumbs down on this novel. Written as a first person narrative by Frannie, a young woman raised on a Jamaican plantation as a house girl in the 1820s. Ignorant of her mixed parentage she is educated as a (Rousseau-like) experiment but without any moral compass. She then travels with her owner (who turns out to be her father) to London where she is "gifted" to one of his financial backers. The novel deals with some very dark subject matter, early eugenics experimentation, opium addiction, the abolition of slavery in name only and finally a trial for murder. Some people did not finish it - feeling this was a novel clearly not to their taste. Others did finish it despite misgivings. There were various complaints; there were no likeable characters, Frannie herself as the narrator was difficult to empathise with, too much content had been included, it was hard to believe the events described, etc. Two of us were the exceptions in finding the novel interesting - though not without its challenges. However, our discussion did touch on some interesting questions. How necessary was it to understand the literary/philosophical references? Did we need to know that this was a reworking of the original gothic novel style so popular in the early 19thC? Given the very dark subject matter of what took place on the plantation - was this a suitable subject for a work of fiction?

National Coastwatch

Burton Bradstock's very own coastal lookout, NCI Lyme Bay situated at Hive Beach, have reported 2023 as being their busiest year since the pandemic. A total of 15 incidents were recorded during the previous 12 months compared to a total of 7 during each of the previous 2 years. The type of incident has varied from live ammunition found on the beach, dead dolphins washed up, to swimmers either not seen for a long period of time or seen in distress in the water.



Following an increase in the number of qualified watchkeepers in recent years it has been possible to increase the number of daily shifts from 2 to 3 during the busy summer months of July and August. The NCI are always looking to recruit new members, both to further increase the number of shifts during British Summer Time and also to replace those who leave the organisation over time.

If you would like to see the inside of the lookout feel free to 'pop-in' for a friendly chat. Provided that there isn't an incident in progress you will be warmly welcomed. Should you like what you both hear and see then NCI Lyme Bay would be more than willing to welcome you to the fold. No prior knowledge of the sea is required. Full training is provided and trainees can learn at their pace.



February Society Talk

The second talk of the New Year will be given by Alan Hooley and as a special treat, after the refreshment break, village resident Audrey Gates will give a short performance. At 90, after a long career in professional Musical Theatre, Audrey has decided to stop performing but not before she does her swan song and entertains us at the February talk.

Alan has been involved with guitars, bands and theatre for much of his teenage and adult - he says that is a long time! During Alan's talk, and in an arts-filled evening, he will introduce us to some of the guitars that joined him on that journey.

And what a journey it has been. Although he was initially taught drums by his father, he was more mesmerised by the guitar boom of the 1960s. Armed with Bert Weedon's 'Play in a Day' book and a second-hand Hofner guitar he set off

to conquer the musical world...but ended up joining the army. Well, it worked for Elvis!

He formed his first band in 1964 aged 16 and performed wherever the army sent him. As a taster for the talk, we can tell you this included the UK, Hong Kong, Berlin, Cyprus and Borneo playing skiffle, rock, pop, folk and country music. Shipton Gorge Parish Council

There are going to be local council elections in May of this year and that includes parish council elections. Most of the present councillors will not be standing for re-election as they have all served for many years. There is, therefore, a need for parishioners to stand as councillors, so please consider becoming one. Not having a Parish Council is not an option. The question is do you want a Council elected by parishioners or one nominated by an outside authority not directly involved in the parish concerns? In our case, it will be by Dorset Council. Furthermore, funds allocated for funding the Parish will also

be controlled by the same authority. All residents should be encouraged to consider how they can help to maintain control over local matters with an elected Parish Council. If there are insufficient parishioners willing to take on this role, Dorset Council will nominate personnel to run the Council which is not an ideal solution.

The Parish Council is your voice as it is consulted by the Dorset Council and government to act for you. It gets consulted on all planning matters and if there are any major issues, will be asked to represent you. It is therefore important to have a strong council. The playing field is another area that the Council is responsible for, and as a village our field is well maintained and used. Some parishioners have criticised the Parish Council either rightly or wrongly so if you want a proactive and reactive Council, it is up to you to become a Councillor and serve the village community and improve it for all. There will be a public meeting held in the Village Hall in February to inform and answer any questions regarding what the Parish Council and Councillors do. The nomination and election process will be explained if you are unsure how it works. Please come along if you are interested. In the playing field, the basketball should now be back in action for all the keen basketball players. Councillor Andrew Fry managed to remove the post which was firmly wedged in the hole, and Councillor John Porter with his team of volunteers will replace the broken hoop and back board and re-instate the post. So, our thanks go to those involved. The roundabout will shortly be repaired. It has been too wet to remove the central spindle, but with the drier weather progress in the repair is expected. It will be good to have all the equipment working properly.

The next Parish Council meeting will be held on Wednesday 13th March, and the Parish Assembly will be held in April. These will be the last meetings that this council will run, and then it is over to the new council, which could involve you.

Saunders Richardson Wood

It has been fairly quiet in the wood recently. We have put mulch mats round the trees recently planted and refurbished some of the halos. Thankfully, despite the recent storms, the trees seem to have got through relatively unscathed.

There was some damage around one of the gateways and the course of the stream has changed slightly and is deeper in places – hardly surprising with the amount of rain which fell and the volume of water which poured through the wood. We are hoping to get some



more nest boxes installed – bird, bat and dormouse ones – ready for when they all start to think about pairing up in early spring. Also planning to do some monitoring of bird species in the wood – would be good to know what is visiting and making use of the boxes etc.

We are hoping to arrange a further hedge laying session in early 2024 – please look out for notices. Please note that the open wood sessions this month will be on Sunday 18 & 25 February 11am-12noon. Any changes to this, we will advise via village Facebook and email. Members only, but we can sign you up on the day.

Berry and Apple Crumble by Jamie Oliver

There is nothing like a warm crumble on a cold winter day, so here we go! **Ingredients:** 800 g mixed apples (such as Bramley, Braeburn and Cox), 4 teaspoons caster sugar, 100 g frozen berries, 20 g cold unsalted butter, 50 g plain flour, 75 g Granola Dust and natural yoghurt to serve.

Method: 1. Preheat the oven to 190°C/375°F/gas 5.

- 2. Peel, core, and quarter the apples, then cut into chunks.
- 3. Place the apples in a pan with the sugar and cook over a low heat, stirring occasionally, for 10 minutes, or until slightly softened. Remove from the heat, stir through the frozen berries, and leave to cool a little.

- 4. Meanwhile, cube the butter and place in a mixing bowl with the flour. Rub together with your fingertips until it resembles breadcrumbs, then stir in the Granola Dust.
- 5. Transfer the fruit mixture to a baking dish and sprinkle over the crumble topping.
- 6. Bake in the oven for 25 to 30 minutes, or until golden and crunchy.

Delicious served with a dollop of yoghurt!




